And I said, well, I was just a little 2 one-horse operation, and I said I was involved with 3 custom farm work. So they --- I just quit then, and 4 that was in the summer of '65. 5 Q. 4 A. Yes.

5 Q. Okay. Let's go to your employment as 6 superintendent of roads in Washington County. You 7 say that you worked with your father for a month 8 before you actually took over; is that accurate?

10 Q. Prior to that time had you had any 11 experience or education in the area of road 12 maintenance?

A. Like I said, I might have worked for 30
or 45 days when I was young with dad, and that was
all.

16 Q. While you were growing up and when your17 father was superintendent of roads in Washington18 County, did you discuss his work with him?

19 A. Yes. We were very, very close.

Q. So would it be accurate to say that you
throughout your formative years were aware of what

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1 performed your duties throughout the 20-year period

2 from 1970 until 1990?

3 A. Yes.

Q. Were you given anything, when you started
as roads superintendent, that indicated to you which
roads in Washington County were the D roads that you
had responsibility for maintaining?

8 A. Would you state that again, please? 9 Q. Yes. I'm sorry. When you became roads 10 superintendent in 1970, were you given at that time 11 anything that told you which roads in Washington 12 County were the B roads that you had responsibility 13 for?

A. I wasn't told, no. But each year the administrator of the B roads would send a map -- a big map about pretty near 4 feet square of Washington County, and it had, oh, colored in the roads that were B roads throughout the county.

19 Q. And you say this was sent to you by some20 supervisor of B roads. Who was that?

A. I can't remember their name, but yes.Q. But was there a state office that sent

23 this map to you?

24 A. Yes.

25 Q. So it was a state office.

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Well, things today are so much different 1 Α. than they were back in '70 when you realize that $\mathbf{2}$ Seventh South here in St. George was the city 3 boundary and all out in -- everywhere else, you know, 4 $\mathbf{5}$ was county roads. And some of the roads you would grade once a year out in the outlying area -- some 6 7 that you would grade once a year. If anybody called in and said it had a flash flood in an area, some 8 rocks had come on the road or washed out, you 9 10 responded immediately to those situations. And the commission sat down -- the 11 12 commissioners sat down, and they decided each year 13 what they want -- what roads needed to be upgraded, whether there was a road to be oiled, a road to be 14 15 realigned and widened, and that they appropriated so 16 much money, sealcoating, for each project. And that 17 was the main guideline that I tried to follow every year, was to accomplish those things, and I think 18 19 that I did all of them every year except the first 20 year. I didn't get the Smith Mesa Road sealcoated. 21 I didn't get that done that first year, which I should have done, but I got it -- we did it the next 22

Q. In terms of maintenance, you bladed all25 the B roads at least once a year; is that accurate?

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1 I think -- yes, I think that would be А. correct, unless you didn't ever have any -- any 2 3 problems. And there was such low traffic. You know, I mean, there might be only even -- not even average 4 5 of one vehicle a day on many of the -- these back 6 roads. And when you say "back roads", you're 7 Q. always referring to B roads, not D roads. 8 9 А. Yes, Yes. Would you on some roads because of 10 Q. increased traffic have to blade them more than once a 11 12 year? 13 Α. Yes. 14 Q. And other than blading the roads to 15 maintain them, would it be accurate to say that your maintenance work was dictated either by the county 16 17 commission or by circumstance? Yes, and then what I decided to do. 18 Α. There's government and then there's 19 Q. 20 government; right? 21 Α. Yeah. All right. I was born in the McGregor Hospital here 14 in St. George, Utah, on May the 14th, 1932. 15 Q. Have you lived all of your life in 16 St. George? 17 Α. All except about two years. I worked at 18 Holbrook, Arizona, for one month when I was 16. I 19 was drafted into the Army in October of 1952. I 20 spent 16 months in Korea. 21 Just by way of background, Mr. McArthur, Q. 22 what I'd like to do for a few minutes is delve into 23 your family's history in this community. How far 24 back do your ancestors go in the St. George, 25 Washington County, area?

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1 All of my ancestors were original Α. 2 settlers here in St. George or in Santa Clara. Daniel D. McArthur, my great grandfather, was with --3 was with the original company that came here in 4 5 December of 1861; my Grandfather, Duncan McArthur, 6 was born in 1875 here in St. George; and my father, Arnold McArthur, was born in -- on the -- oh, 7 February the 20th of 1902 in St. George. 8 9 Q. Let's go back to your great grandfather. I believe you said his name was Daniel D. McArthur. 10 Is that accurate? 11 12 Ά. Yes. 13 Q. Do you know what your great grandfather did for a living? 14He was a farmer and a religious leader. 15 Α. He -- his home sat on the corner right here on this 16 block, and it was still there when -- back in the 17 '50s. I remember it. 18 19 Q. Let's move forward to your grandfather, 20 and his name, I believe you indicated, was Duncan 21 McArthur. Is that accurate? 22 Α. Yes. 23 Q. It sounds like you've got some Scottish 24 roots. Do you? 25 Α. Yes.

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Q. Did you know your grandfather, Duncan
 McArthur?

Very little. My grandmother passed away 3 Α. in 1928 and also my great grandmother in 1928; and, 4 5 of course, I wasn't born until '32. And my grandfather's house was where the county 6 administration building sits today, and I grew up on 7 452 East Tabernacle, but there wasn't many times that 8 I ever remember of going to my grandfather's house 9 because my grandfather had remarried. When they 10 oiled the street on Tabernacle -- when Tabernacle 11 12 Street was oiled, my grandfather was running a 13 grader, and I remember getting in the grader and riding with him, and he gave me a quarter, and 14 that -- that's about all I remember. 15 Do you know what your grandfather did for 16 Q. 17 a living? 18 Α. He was the state superintendent of the 19 roads. I don't know for all of Washington County or 20 just the west end. 21 Did your grandfather -- was he also a 0. 22 farmer or a rancher of some kind? Do you know? 23 Α. Yes. Yes, he -- he had property which is down on River Road, and at the Virgin River he owned 24

25 the property on both sides of the road, and he had --

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1 work for Dean Clark. Dean Clark had a pharmacy right 2 here between, oh, Tabernacle Street and the 3 Boulevard. And he never had any training in 4 pharmacy. He told me that he mixed up all the 5 prescriptions. He never had any training, but he 6 said, "I've always tried every one to make sure it 7 was okay."

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13 the Woodard Building caddie corner over here for four 1 years, then I attended Dixie high school for two 2 years. Back in those days two years of high school 3 and two years of college were together. I graduated 4 5 from high school in May of 1950. 6 Q. Delivering freight here in the St. George 21 area. 22 Did you have a jurisdiction? In other Q. 23 words, when you were delivering freight, were you throughout Washington County? Were you limited to 24 25 St. George? Exactly how were you -- what was your Jerry Martin, RPR

It was just -- it was across the 8 street in the middle of the block from the County Administration Building. 9 10 Q. How long did you remain in the employ of 11 Thompson Heating & Air Conditioning? 12Α. Well, I was -- everything was caught up on the 31st of December of '55. They didn't have any 13 work. I went to -- out to Dixie Feed, which is on 1415the corner of Fourth South and Seventh East, on the northwest corner, which is now a subdivision. I went 16 17 out and asked for a job there, and he wanted me to 18 come -- Dick Schmutz was running it, and he wanted me to come to work on New Year's days, and I said, well, 19 a had a little -- a few things I wanted to do; so I 20 went to work the next day. 21 22 Q. How long were you -- did you remain at 23 Dixle Feed? 24 Ă. Oh, about four months, three or four 25 months, and my good friend Dale Jolley come and
