#### Amount Expended: \$28,373.00

We added a Special Recreation Permit (SRP) Coordinator to our team in June 2023. This is a new position on our table of organization, created with the intent of improving service to our SRP holders and applicants. This position is critical to the effective management of over 100 active SRPs. The SRP position has enabled our office to process permits more efficiently and more effectively monitor impacts from SRP activities and events.

#### Amount Expended: \$12,729.00

Recreation facility enhancements were completed at Sand Wash. Three of five available screen shelters received new screen walls and concrete to replace the dirt floors. These developments were implemented to improve the visitor experience of those preparing to launch on the Green River.

#### Other Accomplishments

- Recreation fee funds were leveraged to replace two double vault toilets and one single vault toilet along the Green River Daily.
- Six highway signs were purchased and installed to direct visitors to the Jurassic National Monument from the state highways.
- Recreation fee funds were used to support a
  Utah Conservation Corps intern that served over
  640 hours in our recreation program.
- 520 fiberglass posts were purchased, and hundreds were installed to implement our travel management plan.
- Nine ADA compliant picnic tables and ten ADA compliant fire rings were purchased and installed at developed campgrounds.

Support ongoing toilet pumping (47 vaults)- \$30,000
Support ongoing garbage collection- \$22,000
Purchase new rafts and frames for the river program-\$20,000
